Objective

Designed for non-majors, this course will enable students to improve their photography skills in both technical and aesthetic modes. Students will be learn digital work-flow methods that lead to better photographs, be introduced to the history of the medium and to influential practitioners, learn digital printing methods, and gain an understanding of visual literacy.

Grading

The final grade will be based upon:

8 photo assignments	100 points each	800 points total

The total for these planned tasks is: 1,200 points

Other factors may influence the grade such as cell phone usage during class, poor attendance, and other issues. Accumulated points will be converted to a percent of 1,200, then to a letter grade using the chart here: http://www.ohio.edu/people/schneidw/images/grades.pdf

Attendance: If someone is absent for more than THREE (3) unexcused absences, their letter grade will be reduced by 5% for each additional instance. Missing SIX (6) or more classes for any reason, excused or unexcused, will be grounds for an automatic failure.

Critiques: Your participation in critiques comprises the majority (80%) of your class participation points. It's important to be able to honestly comment on the work of others in the class for growth to happen. Critiques should be directed at the work itself, not the person, and identify both strengths and weaknesses. If only strengths are stated out of a desire to be liked among the class, you're not doing anyone favors. For the person whose work is being critiqued, keep in mind that both the pluses and minuses are being mentioned for your benefit. It's human nature to become defensive. Identifying weaknesses will reveal areas to practice. Honesty rules in this class, but state it kindly.

Re-shoots: You may re-shoot any ONE assignment between #1 and #7 this semester to achieve a better grade. The last assignment, #8, is not eligible. The re-shoot will be due on the last day of classes.

Email: Class announcements may reach you in two ways. They may be made in class, or correspondence may be sent to your Ohio University email account. Be sure the account is activated, check that announcements don't get automatically placed into a junk mail folder, and be sure to read your mail regularly. If I am ill and must cancel a class, I'll send an email.

File Storage: Picture files can be large, and the lab computers will be wiped clean periodically. Be sure to have either an external hard drive or large USB flash drives so you can transport your work. Having a backup of that portable drive is required in case the device fails. Please don't ignore this advice and arrive at class with excuses instead of work. I enjoy good stories, but your grade really depends upon the photographic-related work that you submit.

Card Reader: You will need a digital memory card reader appropriate for your camera. It should attach to the computer via a USB cable. The two most common memory card formats include Secure Digital (SD), and Compact Flash (CF). If you use cameras from our equipment checkout room, you will have to purchase your own memory cards in addition to the card reader for them.

Print Cards: Several photographic assignments require making quality photographic prints. There will be a cost for print cards to pay for expensive ink and paper in our lab's photo printers. At the current time, print cards cost \$15 each and are good for a number of prints. Printing at copy centers like Kinko's will not provide sufficient print quality to completely satisfy the assignments.

Cell Phones, Texting, and Web Surfing: I promise not to check my text messages, or to surf the web for Facebook updates, or look for sales bargains while in class. In return, I ask that you refrain also. Please turn off cell phones, and don't surf for things unrelated to class. If it occurs, it will be noted and reflected in your grade.

Plagiarism: It may be OK to borrow a general idea or an approach in your photography, but slavishly copying or submitting someone else's work as your own is considered plagiarism. In the real world, lawsuits result and money is forfeited. At the university level, plagiarism falls under the category of academic misconduct for which OU has a policy - http://www.ohio.edu/communitystandards/academic/students.cfm

If plagiarism occurs, the instructor will decide between giving an F grade for the project, or for the entire course, and/or may be referred to the Office of Community Standards and Student Responsibility - University Judiciaries. Possible additional sanctions are likely there. Academic sanctions may be appealed through the process included in the link above. Make all work your own work, and you'll be OK. If you have any questions about an assignment and the possibility of plagiarism, ask beforehand.

Book & Readings: The required book is Photography, by Barbara London, John Upton, & Jim Stone, 11th edition. The 9th and 10th editions will suffice, although the page numbers will differ. Assigned readings will be material considered for the mid-term and final exams even though some of it may not be discussed in class.

Camera: While it is not necessary to own a camera for this class, you will find it very beneficial. VisCom has some photo equipment for checkout for limited periods of time for

those enrolled in the class. To use this facility, you will need to either purchase insurance or demonstrate that you are covered on a homeowner's policy. If an insurance claim is rejected for lost or damaged equipment, you are ultimately responsible for repair or replacement costs. If you own your own camera, it should be capable of taking pictures in camera RAW format in addition to JPGs, and you should have manual overrides for exposure controls.

Server Address for Submissions: When an assignment requests submissions of files to the VisCom server, the address is afp://photoserver.viscom.ohiou.edu (Macintosh computers only). For the login, use vico_2521_ws , and the password is ws367q.
